The rectory office mail drop can be used anytime for your donations. To prevent infection and to slow transmission of COVID-19, do the following:



- Wash your hands regularly with soap and water, or clean them with alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when in public settings or around others.
- Maintain at least six feet distance.
- Avoid touching your face.
- Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing.

Joseph the Helper of the Blessed Mother... St. Joseph was the spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In God's plan of salvation he was a loving husband, kind, considerate, affectionate, and self-sacrificing. St. Joseph had an awesome responsibility with the Blessed Virgin. They

worked as a team. St. Joseph had the responsibility for spiritual leadership since he was the head of the family. God's message from the angel was revealed to him even though the Blessed Mother was much holier through her Immaculate Conception. Obviously, Jesus as the Son of God and creator was far greater, but St. Joseph was chosen because he was the head of that family, just as every one of us is the spiritual head of our family. Joseph and Mary worked as a team. Remember TEAM spells "Together Everyone Achieves More."

Blessing of Throats



In 316, Agricola, the governor of Cappadocia arrested Bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On their way to the jail, a woman set her only son, who was chocking to death on a fish bone, at his feet. Bishop Blaise

cured the child. As early as the ninth century in the Western Church, he was invoked for throat ailments, and by the 15th century, the blessing of the throat ritual had begun. The Blessing of the Throats is a sacramental in the Roman Catholic Church, celebrated on February 3, the feast day of Saint Blaise of Sebaste. For this year, the blessing of throats will take place using the **general form, NOT the individual form.** At the end of Mass this weekend, the priest will extend the candles toward you and say the following prayer...

Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from



every disease of the throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit. Biblically a tithe means 10%. All are asked to consider returning 10% of our income to the Lord (5% to the parish, 5% to God's other charities: e.g. St. Helena Outreach Center, Food Bank) in gratitude. The spiritual practice of tithing disposes us to make God first in every area of our lives! The aim is to secure not the tithe, but the tither, not the gift, but the giver—for God!

Last But Not Least

Today we celebrate the 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Gospel opens with Jesus leaving the synagogue and going to Simon's home accompanied by some of His disciples. When Jesus arrives at Simon's house, He is approached and told that Simon's mother-in-law was ill with a fever. Jesus went to her, took her hand and helped her up. Immediately the fever left her! If Jesus came into our town, our city, would we approach Him and ask Him to heal us? What is the healing we would hope for? Would it be a physical illness, a spiritual need? Would we ask Jesus to heal and restore someone we love? Would we ask Jesus to heal our world and cleanse us of our need to control or hurt one another? Today I invite you to reflect on the healing that you desire for yourself and our world. God will hear our prayer! We may not get an immediate response but trust that God is at work. God will respond! How patient will we be?

This week, we will ponder **Joseph the Helper to the Blessed Mother.** (See page 3 for a short reflection St. Joseph had an awesome responsibility with the Blessed Virgin. In honor of the Year of St. Joseph, as a parish "CHURCH", we will pray the **Memorare to St. Joseph** at the end of Mass. "Remember, O most pure spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, my noble protector, Saint Joseph, that never was it known that anyone who fled to your protection, implored your help or sought your intercession was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I come to you my spiritual Father and fervently commend myself to you. Despise not my petitions, O Guardian of the Redeemer, but in your goodness hear and graciously receive them."

February 3rd is the feast of St. Blaise. Many churches will hold the annual blessing of throats to protect people against and heal them from throat ailments. In honor of the feast of St. Blaise, **THIS YEAR we will use <u>the General Form (YOU remain in your place)</u> for the blessing of the throats rather than the <u>individual form (coming to the priest)</u>. The GENERAL FORM of the blessing will take place at the end of all Masses this weekend**.
