# Year of St. Joseph ~ December 8, 2020 to December 8, 2021



St. Joseph: The Man who Contemplated the Word of God while he Worked... Joseph was this farsighted man who read, contemplated, and prayed the Word, alone and in the family, during the Shabbat and at the synagogue. He welcomed the Word as though God was speaking to him personally. He received it in silence all the more profound because this word sprouted from the depths of God. The Word wedded his silence. His obedience to God was a fruit of his meditation. His life's prayer was made ceaselessly fertile by the Word, not only the Word contained in the Old Testament but that which was before his eyes, the Word-madeflesh, his Son who worked with Him in the Carpenter Shop. Joseph was at Jesus' service and lived what He would announce later: "Work, not for perishable food, but for food that remains for eternal life." (John 6: 27) St. Ignatius of Loyola used to say that we must find God in all things. Now, we find Him in our everyday life, especially in our daily work, whether it be manual or mental. When we work with our hands, at the factory or at home, as Joseph did, we can quiet our interior noise and listen to Him Who speaks in us.

Repetitive work can become a time of prayer. While continuing to work, we can let our thoughts rise up freely toward the Lord in order to praise Him, to remember His Word, to recite a set prayer that live in our hearts, or a verse from the Psalms. This is probably what Joseph did. We share thus in the life of the Spirit who is in labor pains at the heart of the world. We cannot disassociate Mary from Joseph. Jesus has united them forever. They have a special place in the heart of the Church and in every Catholic. This week, as you read the Word of God, whether daily or Sunday, think of Joseph who welcomed the Word as though God was speaking to him personally. You too, can welcome the Word as though God is speaking to YOU personally.

# Next Sunday is Pentecost: The Birthday of the Church

Next Sunday, Christians throughout the world will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday, considered one of the greatest feasts in the Christian liturgical calendar, comes fifty days after Easter Sunday and ten days after the Ascension of our Lord. The Day of Pentecost marked a turning point in the early Christian church. Pentecost, a Jewish feast, was celebrated fifty days after Passover, and pilgrims had come to Jerusalem from all over the world to celebrate the event. We all know the familiar story of what occurred on that Sunday. The Apostles and the Blessed Mother were gathered in the Upper Room, the same room where they had seen



Christ after His resurrection and the same room where they celebrated the Last Supper. Pentecost is the Church's birthday. Jews celebrate the gift of the law to Moses at Mt. Sinai on this day but we, as Catholics celebrate the birth of our Church. As we anticipate celebrating this great feast day next Sunday, perhaps we should ask ourselves how we are exercising the gifts of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Are we spreading the Gospel and continuing the work of Christ within our families, our Church, our communities and our world? Let us use this time to ask God to fill us anew with the Holy Spirit so that our lives may be truly become witnesses to His Gospel.
